There are many legends regarding this song, among them that it was the result of a bet between G. d'Annunzio and F. Russo. Caruso was the first to sing this song, talking about a "vucchela nu poco pucurillo appassiulatella"

1. We praise You Lord

G. N. Triantis

Church hymn, part of Sunday's Mass

2. Triumphal hymn to the Madonna

G. N. Triantis

Sung in all Greek churches before Easter to thank the Madonna for helping save the city of Constantinople from an invasion by the Avars in the 7^{th} century A.D.

3. **Sanctus** (Solo Tenor: N. Papakostas)

Ch. Gounod

4. Ode to youth

D. Rodios

Song praising the beauty and power of youth but also lamenting its short duration

5. **Retsina** (Solo Tenor: N. Papakostas)

N. Hatziapostolou

Tavern song praising wine as the greatest of all life's joys, more valuable than gold and glory

6. At the steps of the Church

D. Lavrangas

Romantic ballad about a boy and a girl meeting every night at the steps of church just to hold hands saying nothing to each other

7. The nightingales are singing

D. Lavrangas

Romantic ballad praising the nightingale song and the fragrance of flowers under the moonlight intoxicating

8. Oh, why did I have to meet you?

N. Kokkinos

Romantic ballad about the joys but also the pains of love that often make us wonder about what fate has in store for us

9. Two enchanting eyes

Composer unknown

Romantic ballad about a girl's eyes that made a boy stay sleepless at night, saying ``if you wonder whose eyes have hurt me so, go look in the mirror and you will know..."

10. **Tete** Th. Sakellaridis

Taken from an operetta, the song praises the charms of a girl named "Tete", dancer of the burlesque, who makes every man who sees her fall in love with her

11. Under the candlelight of a star

M. Theodorakis

Lyrical part of the famous poem ``Aksion Esti'' by Odysseas Elytis (Nobel Prize in Literature 1979), which captures the essence of modern Greek history

12. The ballad of Andreas

M. Theodorakis

Song about Andreas' boat and the girls Katerina, Zoe, Antigone and Zinovia who shared it every summer, until one cold winter came and took Andreas away...

13. The night's song

H. A. Marchner

A very harmonious choir song calling people to wake up, come out of their house and enjoy the beautiful stillness and the magic of the night

14. Ode to bravery

F.Oikonomidis

This song is devoted to the Greek word ``leventia": It means bravery, but is very hard to translate, as it also implies being tall, proud, fearless and always applies to men!

15. The fishermen

G. Georgiadis

Song dedicated to happy fishermen coming back with their nets full, shouting 'eya mola, eya lesa", urging each other to pull the nets in the boat, on the way to the shore

16. Fishing boat from Syros

G. Confiotti

Also a song about fishermen, but this time filled with respect for the sea and its dangers, as well as admiration for its many gifts and its magic beauty Church hymn, part of Sunday's Mass



THE MALE CHOIR OF THE "PANTANASSA" CHURCH OF PATRAS

The four-voice male choir of the church of "Pantanassa", Patras, "George N. Triantis" is named after one of Patras' most famous composers of church music, who founded it in 1890 and served as its director from 1939 to 1944. It consists of 30 members, who come from all sectors of Patras' society and is presently directed by **maestro Theodore Halkiopoulos**. The choir sings religious hymns composed by G. N. Triantis and many other composers like Polycratis, Synouris, Katakouzinos and Sakellaridis. It participates frequently in cultural events organized at Patras and is often invited by many other churches outside Patras to sing and promote the tradition of Patras church music. The choir often gives performances not only of religious but also secular music, written by famous Greek and foreign composers. It has thus performed in several Greek cities and has been invited to take part in International Festivals in Greece and abroad. In 2006, it was selected to participate in an activity called "Religion and Art", in the framework of "Patras – Cultural Capital of Europe of 2006" and in 2004 and 2011 it gave concerts at International Conferences and Summer Schools organized at the University of Patras. The choir has recorded a number of cds during live performances at the holy churches of Pantanassa and Saint Andreas of the city of Patras.
